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Student Groups Committee Update

Group Name: Greening Dining

Description: Greening Dining would like to reduce the environmental impact of the food-related practices on campus. They do so through collaboration with Campus Dining, both by making adjustments in how Campus Dining runs and by increasing student awareness of the environmental impact of the food they eat. They also collaborate with some of the eating clubs (reaching out to the sustainability chairs in order to implement composting), and interact with students on an individual basis (emailing about campaigns, tabling during meals). Their goals include to work on food waste reduction and promotion of eating vegetarian, work on Frist in general, particularly in non-food waste, maintain an active presence on social media (Facebook), and increase the communication between Campus Dining and the community it serves.

Group Name: Figure Drawing

Description: They hope that this club would provide for Princeton students who did not get the chance to take a studio art class a space in which they can get serious about practicing their technical skills at figure drawing. They would like this club to be seen as not just a creative outlet, but as a place where people intent on drawing can get better at doing what they love. They hope it can also serve as a place where people who have never drawn from a model before can get introduced to the field. They plan to host weekly figure drawing sessions, each lasting two hours or so on every Sunday evening Princeton students are anticipated to be on campus. If there is enough interest, they may host different types of events later on in the year (for example, marathon drawing events, where participants would draw for longer periods of time)

Group Name: Princeton University Latinx Perspectives Organization

Description: They intend to launch a photo campaign utilizing the hashtag #ThisIsMyReality to draw attention to issues that affect the Latinx community. They are also planning a campaign to promote interest in the Latino Studies courses, as well as the certificate, and looking for a way to engage with the Latinx community of Princeton members. They also plan on holding weekly executive board meetings, and monthly general assembly meetings. After gaining recognition, they



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plan to create subgroups for LGBTQ+ Latinx students, female-identified students, and other identities within the Latinx community to challenge the notion that Latinos are a monolithic force. They, along with those who signed the petition, feel that there exists a void on this campus for Latinx students to voice their concerns and to mobilize in order to promote social change for our community.

Group Name: Princeton Studies in the Late Antiquity and Middle Ages

Description: The purpose of the journal is to strengthen the community of undergraduates, graduate students, and faculty members with interests in Late Antiquity and the Middle Ages, to give undergraduates a platform to share their research with other Princetonians, and to raise awareness about projects and resources related to Late Antique and Medieval Studies at the University. The journal will be interdisciplinary, accepting contributions from students and faculty members across multiple departments. Beyond Late Antique and Medieval Studies, their goal is to set a precedent for future undergraduate research journals in a variety of disciplines. They hope that such projects will deepen collaboration between students and faculty members, encourage undergraduates to pursue advanced research, connect students of similar interests through the peer-review process, and give undergraduates the experience of publishing their work for the wider University community. They plan to publish one issue per academic year. They may try to host some informal events (discussions, lectures, etc.) to coincide with the publication of our journal.

Group Name: Cognitive Science Society

Description: This group aims to create an interdisciplinary community of students who want to discuss the mind as studied in philosophy, linguistics, engineering, neuroscience, and beyond. No community like this exists on campus, and it works well in conjunction with the new certificate program in Cognitive Science so students can gain research ideas from one another and discuss questions that interest them. They hope to have one academic event biweekly. Examples include thematic dinner discussions with professors or graduate students or less formal tea events where students can interact with different faculty members who do interdisciplinary research. On off weeks, they plan to have a social event for undergraduate members (ice cream social, movie night, dinner together to discuss research ideas, etc).

Group Name: Princeton Futurist Society

Description: They wish to have periodic structured discussions (twice a month) on a futurist topic. Futurist, in this context, refers to any topic concerning humanity's long-term future. This would



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include but is not limited to the prospect of genetic modification and the creation of a new species, nanotechnology and all of its implications, space exploration and colonization, the potential discovery of alien species, artificial intelligence, the Singularity (the merging of man and machine), and the prospect of humans becoming a-mortal. They hope to also involve graduate students and act as a body for the promotion of discourse between graduates and undergraduates. Furthermore, we will organize guest speakers and seminars. Professor Tilghman is the first that we have reached out to, but we have already identified several other Princeton professors who are conducting research that would be relevant to PFS. Finally, we intend to collaborate with other clubs who have some overlap, such as Innovation Science or SEADS, on organizing joint events. There is far more scope for expansion: serving as a central coordinating body for research that pertains to futurism, and establishing intercollegiate cooperation, perhaps through an intercollegiate competition. They believe futurism issues are incredibly important; collectively, they herald a thorough transformation of our social, economic, and political systems, of science, of humanity, even of life. But they are barely discussed on campus, or at least not in an organized manner. The Princeton Futurist Society would like to change that, and both raise awareness and promote discussion of futurist issues.

Group Name: Gymnastics

Description: Although they have high hopes for the future, they would like their main level of activity to be meetings and simple practices in the Martial Arts Room. These would serve as regular conditioning and stretching practices to build and prepare a team that would hopefully become competitive in the future. Once they have a growing group of participants, they could run fun fundraisers such as joining with cheerleaders to do a backhandspring-/flip-athon during half times in games to raise money for mats and other equipment. During their time here, they have found that there is an impressive ex-gymnast community on campus. This includes many people who have competed at top levels, including an old member of England's national gymnastics team. They have found it quite frustrating that there are no resources to continue the sport that they have done for most of their lives, and that there are no opportunities for people interested in picking up and pursuing gymnastics. They are sure that this will become a successful group as it picks up speed, and they would very much like to see this group get a chance to become established.

Group Name: Alabaster Princeton

Description: Alabaster is a program that already exists on other college campuses. They plan always to have theyekly meetings dedicated to campus intercession and spiritual growth as a community. This is at the core of their group. Furthermore, in the context of their meetings, they want to encourage members to practice their preaching/public speaking abilities by preaching sermons. They also plan to engage in more outreach, such as sharing the Gospel with and praying for students on



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the Street. As an inter-fellowship group, they can also support unity bettheyen the various Christian groups on campus by inviting them to the Alabaster Group conferences.

Group Name: Woodworking

Description: They hope to first set up a few rounds of staggered Lewis Center woodshop trainings, in accomodation with different schedules, to allow clearance for their members to work with the machinery. Following each of these trainings, they hope to plan an informal dinner or ice cream trip to help fellow members get to know one another. They will continue these trainings intermittently throughout the year as needed, to ensure additional members can join if interested. When the majority of their members have been trained, they hope to have a few 3-4 hour sessions per theyek where students can work together to collaborate on building a project, or work independently on a project of their choosing. Given that they have previous woodworking training and experience, club officers will be available at these sessions for particular questions or advice. they also hope to offer additional "workshop" sessions every few months where they will dedicate 3-4 hours toward teaching one or two particular skills.

Group Name: Wounded Tigers Network

Description: Princeton does not offer a formal network of student-athletes to provide injured athletes a support group offering guidance and assistance through recovery processes. There are faculty members available on campus for suffering student-athletes, hotheyver, it can be intimidating and difficult to open up to an adult. A student-led network would not only provide a support group of fellow students but it will also supply fellow student-athletes who better understand what the injured member is going through. It is their hope that the Wounded Tigers Network can fulfill a need for an on-campus, strong support group for injured athletes. Many athletes have already mentioned that they wish this service theyre available when they theyre injured in years past. Therefore, it is their hope that the group meetings provide a comfortable space for injured athletes to let out frustrations and obtain needed advice. Hopefully this will be useful to current and future Tigers.

Group Name: Princeton Film Festival

Description: Last year was the inaugural year of the Festival, and their featured guest was Jon Stahl, who was able to fly in from California to speak. His talk was titled "Deep Structure: Conceiving Screenplays That Can Resonate Professionally." They also invited several of the filmmakers with official selections to the Festival, and who each spoke briefly about their process and did a Q&A



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with audience members. They have already begun arranging speakers for the second annual Festival, and have organized a screenwriting workshop. Last year, they wanted the Princeton Film Festival to engage more deeply with other, existing organizations on campus; this year, PFF has been in communication with the Princeton Film Producers and Princeton University Rock Ensemble to collaborate on future events and (in the case of PURE) to potentially put on a Festival opening concert. Many Princeton residents attended the Festival last year, and so they would like to make more of an effort to engage the community and institute outreach events during the year. The Festival team believes that an open dialogue between creative artists is much-needed, and that the Princeton community has a great deal to offer the Festival and the students on campus, and vice versa.

Group Name: Princeton Competitive Engineering

Description: They would like to create opportunities for competitive, innovative engineering at Princeton. By engaging students in year-long project competitions, PCE seeks to bridge the gap between Princeton students and the greater engineering community. Additionally, by formally adopting year-long engineering tasks, PCE will allow students to gain both experience in engineering and associated fields. They hope that over time, the influence of PCE would encourage other Princeton students to engage with students and professionals outside the University. Typical activities will be goal-oriented in nature, such as collaborative design, prototype fabrication, and engagement with the engineering community. For example, in its inaugural year, PCE will be participating in SpaceX's Hyperloop Competition, working alongside students from other universities in a greater team named OpenLoop. PCE will contribute to the design and possible fabrication of a transport "pod" in accordance with the HyperLoop competition.

Group Name: Princeton Real Estate

Description: They are a huge advocate for the real estate industry and extremely passionate about getting other Princetonians involved. With the surplus of finance and investment related groups on campus, they feel that the real estate industry is just as desirable and popular throughout the student body. In short, it is their hope to expose students today, and in the future, to real estate and share their passion for the field. They have been working with Robert Bremmer, whom their president interned for this past summer, as they'll as Jeremy Glantz (President of the Princeton Alumni Real Estate Network) to create an interconnected relationship between the Alumni network and the Undergraduate group. There will be a panel of real estate entrepreneurs this fall/winter that will serve to set precedence for following events that they will coordinate based off general interest from fellow members and students on campus.

1.3 Text of Referendum Measures

- For all petitions submitted, the Chief Elections Managers will serve as the Vice President's designate for receiving petitions and will immediately inform the Vice President of their submission.
- The Chief Elections Managers shall establish and make public a way of delivering the petition that is identical to the requirements of candidate's submission of registration forms. This will include the identical drop-off location, times, and deadlines.
- Before a sponsor begins collecting signatures on a referendum petition, the text of the referendum measure must be reviewed and approved by the USG Senate Executive Committee and the Institutional Research Office at Princeton University for neutral wording and clarity.
- Not later than 6 weeks before the start of a scheduled election, a potential sponsor of a referendum measure shall contact the Chief Elections Manager and Vice President to discuss the proposed text of the referendum measure.
- The Chief Elections Manager and the Vice President shall work with the potential sponsor on the text of the proposed referendum measure and, **on the fourth day** after being contacted by the potential sponsor, submit the text to the USG Senate Executive Committee.
- After receiving the proposed text, the USG Senate Executive Committee shall have **four days** to review the text for neutral wording and clarity and either approve or disapprove the text of the proposed referendum measure.
- **On the fourth day** after receiving the text of the proposed referendum measure, the USG Senate Executive Committee shall either approve or disapprove the text, and the Vice President shall forward the text to the Institutional Research Office for its review for neutral wording and clarity. The Institutional Research Office shall approve or disapprove the text of the proposed referendum measure **by 5 p.m. on the Friday of the week in which they received the petition.**
- If the Institutional Research Office approves the text of the proposed referendum measure, the potential sponsor may begin collecting signatures for the petition to have the referendum measure appear on the ballot during the USG election in question. The petition must be submitted to the Chief Elections Manager not later than 3 weeks before the start of the scheduled election. **A petitioner may begin collecting signatures starting at 5 p.m. on the Sunday before the due date for the required number of signatures and will be guaranteed a total of 7 days to collect signatures.**



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Thanksgiving Buses Recap

Execution: The buses went smoothly to their destinations and back in the allotted time. All students were given updates before the buses departure and return as to destinations and timetables and policies. Bus captains were very helpful and responsive, albeit they were not paid or compensated for their time. We received a few last minute emails from students who wanted to purchase return tickets from Boston and we were able to accommodate those students as well.

Profit/Deficit: In previous years, there has been a deficit, however this year we made a profit of \$312. Although, it is not our goal to profit from this project, we are happy that we were able to charter four buses and not have a deficit.

Improvements: Tickets for the first bus to Boston sold out on the first day of sales. Per our demand policy, we opened the wait list and were able to charter a second bus to Boston. In order to guarantee that the students on the wait list would have a chance to purchase their tickets, we implemented a 48-hour grace period and then opened the sale to everyone else, which was not done in previous years.

Moving Forward: As this is a standard annual service, we believe that maintaining the same pricing structure, destinations, and policies would be helpful moving forward. Innovations to this project may include a car-pool bulletin for students who were not able to take the buses because they waited too long.

This will be our third year of providing Wintersession programming during intersession and on behalf of the team, I would like to portray how excited we are for all that is to come with the project. This especially concerns some new innovations that we are planning for this year!

Important Dates:

Course Proposals Submission: Monday 12/7 to Friday 12/18

Course Enrollment Window: Wednesday 1/13 to Saturday 1/23 (During Finals)

Wintersession: Monday (1/25) - Saturday (1/30) (Intersession)

Innovations Since Last Year:

Design: After deciding that the previous Wintersession website was too "winter-bleak" and the logo a bit too "blocky," we've designed a **new logo** to be brighter and more sustainable for coming years. We've used the color scheme from the new logo to **change the website design scheme** as well.

Giveaways: This year we are giving out around 1500 pens (with a Wintersession design on them), as well as 50 Wintersession-designed mugs for prizes to our social media competition winners.

Social Media: In the past, the Wintersession team has always struggled to find a way to showcase the new talents gained and connections made during Wintersession programming (ex: end of week Gala/showcase, etc.). This year we have decided to launch a social media campaign during Wintersession that will both urge students to share their new skills and talents (online) and simultaneously publicize Wintersession. We will be creating **#Wintersession2016**, which will be connected from Twitter and Facebook to a live stream on our website if all goes well with IT. We will award our top 50 or only social media participants with specially designed Wintersession mugs!

Wintersession Recreation Committee: We felt that one of the major areas for improvement for Wintersession concerns creating more large-scale, casual events where students can hang out and enjoy each other's company outside of the classroom. As many of the members of the USG Wintersession team are not on campus during intersession, we would like a team of willing members to (1) Use USG funding to plan fun activities for students during Intersession (Pajama + Movie Night, Hot Cocoa Study Break, etc.) and (2) be our liaisons to campus during the week. We would like to extend this opportunity to Senate and all Class Government officers who are on campus during the week.



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Publicity: Launching on Monday 12/7, we will be getting in contact with all ODUS groups, previous Wintersession instructors, and academic departments to advertise the opportunity to submit course proposals. In order to publicize enrollment during Finals Weeks (1/13-1/23), we will be attacking listservs as well.

Action thus far: We've coordinated a lot of logistics in reaching out and forming partnerships on and off campus, booking venues, coordinating timing and parking for off-campus partners
